This month your roving reporter has traveled to California (well, not really). In fact, I interviewed Gary while he was visiting me in Rhode Island.

Gary began his collecting of carnival glass back in 1977. When asked what his favorite company was, his answer was all 4! However, he likes Imperial when the color is fantastic. He also likes to find a great piece of Fenton that's hard to find.

His pattern....he said, "Oh, boy!" It's usually the piece that he just purchased. He doesn't really have a favorite, but is partial to Rose Show & Poppy Show. His favorite color is Celeste Blue right now.

His funniest story...well, back when he was new at collecting carnival glass, he stopped by a flea market in LA called The Troubleshooter with a friend. Only in the club for one year, he saw this White Cosmos & Cane footed compote for \$20 (every other piece in the booth was new). I asked my friend, "is it old?" He said, "What do you think? What do you see around you?" (Gary thought it was old). His friend bought the piece. The good news is they are still friends.

Gary has broken a few pieces of glass. He handles over 30,000 pieces of glass a year so he figures that's a pretty good track record.

His best deal...was the Aqua Opal Poppy Show Plate he purchased in San Francisco in November of 19989 at an antiques show. He paid \$3,500. The next day, he was offered \$10,000 by Don Moore. Gary said "no" and Don walked away "steaming". His wife grabbed Gary and said, "good move". Then Gary found out that night that another had sold for \$15,000. Gary just sold it recently for just under \$40,000.

His dream piece to own is a Peach Opal Farmyard Bowl. With Gary's luck, he just might find it!

STARS OVER INDIA STARS OVER INDIA, PALIWAL VARIANT STARS OVER INDIA, SASNI VARIANT



Prior to 1996 there were a small number of unusual tumblers known that were thought to have been made in Europe, possibly Czechoslovakia. Since 1996, India was proved to be the manufacturing source of these items. One of the Stars Over India tumblers was known at that time and today we know of at least two others which are considered to be Variants of the same pattern. At the present time there are approximately sixty five Indian tumbler patterns that are known, some of which were made in more than one size.

It will become increasingly more difficult in the future to trace who made any particular Indian pattern as many of the six hundred plus glass factories that were in the Firozabad area of India no longer exist. It is ironic that this can be attributed to Chinese imports of glass to India. Fortunately, we can attribute two of the Stars Over India tumblers to particular factories which we know something about and which have distinct trademarks. All of these tumblers come in marigold.

The first Stars Over India tumbler that surfaced had just the basic design that is found on all three tumblers. What distinguishes it from the Variants is that they have a few other features placed around the basic design. The pattern consists of a band about 3/4" below the rim which has three stars and three circles evenly spaced within the band. A clue that the circles might represent the

moon can be found on the Paliwal Variant. From the bottom of the band are six thin raised lines evenly spaced that extend down to the tops of six evenly spaced pyramids. The pyramids consist of small squares on top of each other. On this tumbler they are 19 squares high from the base to their tops. In the middle of the raised line between the band and pyramid is a diamond shape which has pincer shaped objects on each side of it. The measurements of the tumbler are 5 5/16" high, 3" rim, and a 2 1/4" base on which there are 16 triangle shaped blobs in two rows surrounding a circle.

The Paliwal Variant tumbler has two features that differ from the basic pattern described above. Below the rim are six lines circling the tumbler and underneath them a band that appears to contain flowers. Directly under this the basic pattern is the same as the original except in the band there are four circles and two stars having half moons along side them. The bottom of this band has six curved shapes. Below this is more basic pattern, the only difference being the pyramids from the base to their top are 17 squares high. The tumbler's measurements are: 5 5/8" high, 3 1/2" rim and a 2 1/8" base which has the maker's trademark PALIWAL in capital letters. An unusual base feature is that there is another circle directly inside the circling base rim.

The Sasni Variant again has the basic pattern with a couple of exceptions. Below the tumbler rim is a band of flowers beneath which is another band with evenly spaced four circles and two stars paired with moons. There are thin arcs below this from which the basic pattern extends down. The square blocks forming the pyramids from the base up are fourteen squares high. The measurements are 5 3/8' high, 3 1/4" rim with a 2" base. On the base is the Khandelwal Glass Company's trademark SASNI. Sasni is actually the name of the town where the company is located about 165 kilometers northwest of Firozabad. The owners of the company happen to be named Jain, but that does not mean they are related to the owners of Jain Glass. Jain is a very common name in India, there being over 4000 Jains in the Bombay telephone book alone. Happy Hunting! Feedback – necgabobsm@aol.com
