# **Secretary Report**

## From: Sunday, October 10th meeting.

Present at the meeting: Kris & Don, Gary & Steve, Dave & Sue, Ben, Bob, Paul & Yvette Berube, Bruce & Anna, Harold & Lynne and Norm. Show & Tell took place at 10:00 a.m. and the meeting began at 10:40 a.m.



## **Old business:**

- 1. Last Club Meeting Minutes/Report: Sue made a motion, seconded by Bruce. All were in favor.
- 2. Treasury Report: Gary stated that year over year (2020 vs. 2021) the club treasury shows an increase of \$1,000.00. Dave made a motion to accept the report and it was seconded by Bob. All were in favor.
- 3. Board meetings: none
- 4. Regarding the bi-law amendment, Harold would like to see a full report in the bulletin as it should be sent to all members. Steve will include it in the December bulletin.

## **New Business:**

- 1. The banquet food was not up to standard...in fact, it was terrible. The hotel heard our grumblings and when Steve went to pay the hotel our convention balance, the hotel told us they were comping our banquet costs to the tune of \$1,530.00. That was great news, but we have to remember that our banquet, hospitality and glass room rental costs along with not meeting our room night (less than 40)/banquet dinner (34 meals were ordered) quota, we actually would have lost money. What helped tremendously was our mini auction proceeds and the Wroda's donation to the club showing that the convention actually profited by approximately \$1,700.00.
- 2. That being said, the club is apprehensive about the food for next year's convention. Are there any other options? General discussion took place and one of the ideas brought to the table was to bring in a caterer. Would the hotel event allow us to do this? Would our banquet room and other expenses go up? These questions need to be answered and Steve will approach the hotel with these issues.
- 3. Due to the poor food quality, additional discussion took place with those present. A motion was made by Bob Preseau that anyone that <u>had ordered</u> a meal in 2021, will get a \$30.00 credit to their next year's meal. All were very much in agreement.
- 4. Further discussion took place about moving the convention location. We don't have a lot of options due to higher hotel costs in other areas and to actually find a hotel that can accommodate our needs will be hard, but this is an ongoing topic for more discussion. It was also mentioned that we have been with the Doubletree for so long, they have treated us well and until this year, we have had no problems or issues.
- 5. Our three main concerns for next year: Date, Location and Food options.
- 6. Other new business was the idea that we have a "zero tolerance" policy added to our bi-laws. Further discussion will take place at the December meeting.
- 7. At our December meeting, it was voted to have a catered lunch. Dave volunteered to check with some catering companies in his area. He will let Steve know what he finds out. Ben also volunteered to check but it may be more logical to stick with a company that is close to Gardner.
- 8. Spring Fling was also discussed. Everyone's comments regarding staying at the Hampton Inn in Wells, Maine were the same. Again, the hotel accommodates our needs and we get a free meeting room. Steve is checking with the hotel on rates and to see if April 10<sup>th</sup> is available.

### New England Carnival Glass Association

Constitution and By-Laws (effective 10/2021)

Article I - The name of the organization shall be the New England Carnival Glass Association

Article II - The Emblem of the Association shall be the emblem depicting the New England States

Article III – The Motto of the Association shall be "Carnival Glass Forever"

Article IV – The New England Carnival Glass Association shall be a non-profit organization and have a calendar fiscal year ending December 31st.

Article V – Any collector, dealer or lover of Carnival Glass shall be eligible to become a member of the Association upon submitting a written application for membership and the payment of dues as decided by the Board of Directors, Officers and membership. The voting power of each member of the Association shall be equal, and members have the right to vote by absentee ballot on affairs of the Association deemed appropriate by the Board of Directors (this does not include day to day business voted on at a regular meeting.)

Article VI – The Association shall be directed by the following elected officers: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and a Board of Directors. The Association membership shall nominate and elect a board of directors to number five, at large. The immediate past President shall be an Ex-Officio member to the Board of Directors. The Association will elect 3 members based on upon the higher vote count, to sit a 2-year term. Next year, the Association will elect 2 members for a 2-year term. The Association will have an election of our BOD every year from that point on. An officer or board member may serve continuous elected terms. Nominations for officers and board members will be taken at the regular club meeting held in conjunction with the annual convention. Should only one individual be nominated for a position, a vote may take place at the convention meeting to elect said person(s). If two or more individuals are nominated for a position then a ballot for the election of those officers and/or board members shall be published in the October bulletin so that all members could vote by absentee ballot if unable to attend the annual meeting in October.

Article VII – At a regularly scheduled meeting, members (7) present shall constitute a quorum for all purposes, except amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws. Opening of the Constitution and By-Laws to amendments must first be approved by the Board of Directors. Amendments must then be published in a Bulletin to allow for a discussion period and then a final draft of amendments voted on by the majority of those responding by absentee ballot.

Article VIII – In an event that any office shall become vacant, for any cause, prior to the annual meeting, such vacancy shall be filled by the Board of Directors. Each such successor may hold office for the remainder of the term of the person who he/she has succeeded.

Article IX – The Officers of the Association and/or Board of Directors are empowered to establish such committees as they deem necessary and nominate such committees to be voted on by the membership at any regularly scheduled meeting.

#### Article X - Duties

The President shall preside over all functions and meetings and serve as an ex-officio member of the Board of Directors for one year after his/her presidency has ended. The president shall be the principal executive officer of the Association and shall have general charge and management of business, affairs and property of the Association. The president shall submit to the members and to the Board of Directors, a current report of the operations of the Association and a statement of its affairs in the bulletin.

The Vice President shall preside at the meetings of the Association whenever the President is absent. The Vice President shall also oversee the business, affairs and property of the Association when so directed by the President to ensure all pertinent matters are properly carried out on behalf of the Association.

The Treasurer shall receive all monies of the Association, record same with specificity, as to date and bearer, and enter said monies into a secure bank account in behalf of the Association. The Treasurer shall have the care and custody of the monies, funds, receipts, disbursements, securities, and valuable papers or documents of the Association. The Treasurer shall also collect and receive all membership dues (they will now be renewed at the time the members joined the Association). The Treasurer shall submit for publication in the bulletin full report of the financial affairs of the Association, and in addition shall submit for publication in the bulletin a detailed account of all convention transactions of a monetary nature with specificity as to income and expense along with a balance sheet account. The convention report shall be available for printing in the bulletin no later than the December bulletin annually.

The Secretary shall be responsible for all new members and renewal memberships and the recording of all paid members. The Secretary is also responsible for all written correspondence between the Association and other Carnival Glass clubs and publications, as well as all social communications and placing of ads for our convention (<u>i.e.</u> thank you, sympathy, get well, etc.) It shall also be the duty of the Secretary to maintain the Association library and keep accurate inventory of the same.) The Secretary shall keep pertinent written records of all meetings of the Association. The secretary shall supply the bulletin editor the minutes and recorded information from each meeting that will be included into each respective bulletin.

The bulletin editor shall be a volunteered role by any interested member. If there is no interest from membership, the president shall appoint the role, or the president will assume the role until interest is provided. Said person shall be responsible for the editing of the bulletin which shall include but not be limited to the Association logo, pertinent history and information about Carnival Glass and related business interests of the Association and its membership. Said bulletin shall include the minutes and recording of the previous meeting provided by the secretary and shall be made available to the membership at least 10 days prior to any meeting. Bulletin expense shall be accounted for in the Treasurer's reports.

The Board of Directors shall have and may exercise all the Powers of the Association except such as are reserved to the members by law, the Constitution and the By-Laws. The Board of Directors shall have the management over all business affairs of the Association and is hereby vested with all powers passed by the Association itself, so far as this delegation of authority is not inconsistent with the law. Special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be called by the Secretary at the request of the President or a majority of directors. Ten days' notice shall be given for a calling of special meeting of the board unless all board members are notified and can attend an earlier date. Special meetings can use electronic means of communication that are available to all board members and appropriate officers.

Committee Chairpersons shall conduct Association business as directed by the President and/or Board of Directors for the good of the Association.

Article XI: The Association will hold periodic club meetings at places and dates to be determined by the club. Scheduled meetings must be advertised in the preceding newsletter. The annual convention, which will include a club meeting, will held on a date and a location determined by the club.

All NECGA meetings will follow the current Robert's Rules of Order.

# Imperial 's 393 Colonial Flute Pattern by Gary Sullivan

The January 1909 Imperial Glass Company catalog shows various pieces of glass listed under the mold number 393. Imperial made its first glass in 1904 and this catalog featured "table glassware, lamps and tumblers." In 1909, apparently after this catalog was published, Imperial made its first carnival glass using many of these existing molds which had previously been used for making crystal glass. The catalog explains that Imperial was making two kinds of glass. First Imperial made "our famous Imperial mirror glass, used by us principally for our high grade wares, which have established our reputation for quality." Second, "our Utility glass, used by us for certain wonderful specialties at very low prices for large and rapid sales." Imperial explains the difference in the two types of glass as being a different process of melting which results in a glass "not quite as brilliant and pure in color" although "frequently there is hardly any difference". Imperial States that "In this catalog the pieces made in Utility glass are distinguished by the 1/2 behind the numbers, whilst the numbers of the articles made in Imperial mirror glass do not show the 1/2."





This pitcher and tumbler is part of the No. 393 line. A pitcher and six tumblers form a water set.

Each 393 Colonial Flute piece has plain, wide and indented vertical panels with arched tops that sit below a plain area. Handles are part of the mold and include notches on the outer edge. Bowls have a scalloped sawtooth rim while the cordials, pitchers and tumblers would have a flat top rim. Bowls have a collar base, pitchers a domed foot, cordials a stem and tumblers and cups have ground bases but all have a rayed star design under them.

The January 1909 catalog shows many pieces in 393 including a four piece table set, molasses cans with metal lids, oil bottle with stopper, water bottles, two styles of pitchers, tumbler, 1 oz cordial, 2 oz wine, sherbert, covered fruit bowl, covered fruit bowl with foot, orange bowl with foot, punch set, bowls of various sizes, and a custard cup. However, not all items made in crystal were subsequently made in Carnival Glass. Shapes found in Carnival Glass are:

- **Bowls** Bowls may or may not form a berry set which consists of a large bowl and six matching sauces. Bowls have 8 panels and are found flared or ruffled. While mostly found in marigold; smoke, green and a very rare blue are also known.
- **Cordials** Cordials stand about 3" tall and have a notch in the stem where it meets the base. Found only in marigold. Wines, which would be slightly larger, may also exist.
- **Punch Sets** The bowl and base have a sawtooth edge and may be ruffled or round. Cups were sold to accompany the punch bowl and also separately as custard cups. Found in marigold and green.
- Water Sets Consisting of a pedestaled pitcher and six tumblers. Tumblers have 8 panels and a flat ground base. Water sets are found in marigold only.

# Imperial 's 393 Colonial Flute Pattern (continued)





The marigold punch set, above, has a ruffled top and a ruffled base. The green set has a ruffled top and a round base. The marigold set, below, has a round top and a round bottom. The Imperial catalog lists punch bowls and punch sets with round tops and round bases but also shows a footed orange bowl with a ruffled top. The cup is listed as both a punch cup and a custard cup. These listings also show that, for some pieces, the 393 mold number may be followed by both an additional number and a letter. Here, the additional "9" may reference a size while the letters "A" or "C" may reference how the bowl was shaped.









ground bottom, hand polished. packed 30 dozen in barrel. barrel lots, \$0.40 per doz. smaller lots, 0.45 per doz.

When the unruffled marigold punch set above, sold in 2019, it was listed as being the only known round top. Round and ruffled bases seem to be equally found in marigold. In green, Hooked On Carnival shows only round bases and ruffled tops.

## Imperial 's 393 Colonial Flute Pattern (continued)



To the left are three sizes of ruffled bowls. The two bowls along the top are 10 and 9 inches across and the five smaller bowls on the bottom are 4 1/2 inches across. The ad below, from the 1909 catalog, shows that the No. 3934C 4 1/2 inch crimped berry and the No. 3937C 9 inch crimped berry could be purchased separately or as a berry set consisting of one 9 inch and six 4 1/2 inch bowls. The catalog also shows No. 393 4 and 7 inch round berries and No. 393F 5 and 9 inch shallow round berries and 3937N and 3939N as 7 and 9 inch nut bowls. No. 3935A and 3938A were 5 and 8 inch round berries. No. 3939 A or F referred to 11 inch bowls either round or ruffled. These bowls have a sawtooth top edge just as the punch bowls do, although it is less pronounced. The exteriors also have a fainter flute pattern than the punch bowls but it is


Sometimes auctioneers will list a marigold Imperial Flute wine. It is most likely also part of the 393 line. To the right is a picture out of Imperial's 1909 catalog showing a 393 1/2 cordial, as well as, a photo of an actual cordial. These cordials have only been found in marigold. Thanks to Hooked on Carnival for the cordial photo. The cordial is listed as having a capacity of 1 oz. and is packed 50 dozen in a barrel and sold for 16 cents a dozen. The catalog also lists a 2 oz. wine that is packed 35 dozen in a barrel and sold for 18 cents a dozen. Why can't I find one!







These final two photos show a No. 3930 1/2 gallon pitcher. It is listed as "Colonial pattern, a very large jug." It has not been found in carnival but does show that Imperial did call the 393 pattern Colonial". To the right is a creamer with a sandblasted or etched pattern. The 27 after the mold number is the number of the etching. No etched or table set piece is known in carnival.



# Pattern Parade — Imperial's Acanthus





Acanthus leaves radiate in a swirl from the center of these pieces. Found only in bowls and plates made from the same mold. Bowls are usually round as shown here. Plates are about 10 inches across and are considered chop plates.

Bowls can be found in aqua, a rare blue, clambroth, helios, marigold, purple and smoke. Chop plates are found in a more limited range of colors of clamborth, marigold and smoke.


This is a different pattern than Beaded Acanthus, seen only in milk pitchers, but also made by Imperial.

Fenton made a club souvenir from the original mold of this pattern for the International Carnival Glass Assoc. in celeste blue. The souvenir was for their 1995 convention held in Dallas Texas.









Fenton made two acorn patterns; Acorn and Autumn Acorns. **Acorn** is found almost entirely in smallish bowls. The other, Autumn Acorns, is most quickly identified by the leaf in the center.

The red bowl, above, is the typical Acorn shape. Acorn comes in an array of different colors and red is actually very common in this pattern. There are only a few known plates. The small bowls are typically 7 to 8 inches across and can be ruffled, round or ice cream shaped. The many colors found include amber, amber opal, amberina, amethyst, amethyst opal, aqua, blue, powder blue, green, ice blue, lavender, lime green, marigold, marigold on milk glass, marigold on moonstone, peach opal, pink, red, vaseline, white and yellow.

Plates are rarer and thus are found in fewer colors of amethyst, blue, green and white. There is also a nut bowl shape that is found in marigold and red. Other colors in any shape are sure to be found.



Fenton's **Autumn Acorn** also has a spray of leaves and groups of acorns.
But this one is easy to distinguish from Acorn as it has a leaf in the center.
Found mostly in 9-inch bowls and a few rare plates.



On the left is a ruffled bowl in vaseline; on the right a plate in marigold. Plates are most often seen in green, rare in other colors including amethyst, blue and marigold. Bowls can be ruffled, 3in1 or ice cream shaped but candy ribbon edge (CRE) bowls are rather scarce. Bowls are found in a wider range of colors including amethyst, blue, green, lime green, marigold, persian blue, red and vaseline.
